Prior to joining GE, Steve practiced environmental law at Sidley & Austin and was the first Chief of The Environmental Enforcement Section at the US Department of Justice from 1980-85 during which time he supervised more than 75 lawyers who handled civil and criminal prosecutions under federal environmental laws. Steve was awarded the Attorney General's Distinguished Service Award for creation of the Environmental Crimes Unit at DOJ.
